Part of becoming the pastor at The Village meant sharing my vision with the elders and deacons of the church. My understanding of what a church should be involved multiplication, primarily through church planting. This heartbeat of multiplication began to take shape through plants in Frisco and Keller, but it also took shape in a way I'd not imagined, with campuses.

In thinking about the campus model, I've seen so many beautiful, God-wrought things occur in and through campuses. But campuses in this model are also hemmed in; they can't contextualize to their specific city and neighborhoods. I also believe that the time, energy and resources spent making a multisite church work and function can be redirected toward doing more to train up and send out missionaries and church planters.

The elders and leaders of The Village believe, compelled by the Holy Spirit, that working together in unison as the five campuses to multiply out into autonomous churches gives us the best possible ability and capacity to contextually reach our cities with the gospel of Jesus Christ. We're calling our vision and plan to do this Multiply.

Multiplication is how God has subdued the earth and reconciled people to Himself. By entering into Multiply at The Village, we're inviting you to participate in God's good plan to seek, save and redeem the lost peoples of the world. You're doing multiplication if you're sharing the gospel with a coworker or a family member, discipling your children, leading a Home Group—all these are a part of the mission of God.

When I think of what the Denton campus has become—now a church in the city of Denton, for Denton—I celebrate their flourishing, and I hope for that same outpouring for our other campuses as they become local churches within the next five years.

If you're a member here who has fears and anxieties about this move, my encouragement to you is that you would lean into those fears and trust that the Lord will do something greater and more beautiful than what you're experiencing now. Every time we've come to that crossroads of trusting God without knowing what will happen, He has brought more men and women to Himself and has grown us in our understanding of Him. I hope you'll take this step with us.

BACKPACK DRIVE

One of the ways we participate in **gospel-centered service** in our community is by serving our schools. In the summer, we participated in LISD's Back to School Fair, which helps over **4,000** economically disadvantaged students get the supplies and resources they need to start school. We asked you to participate by donating supplies and volunteering before or during the fair. We ended up donating **1,250** backpacks, and **400** volunteers stuffed backpacks and helped out the day of the event.



CAMPUS PICNIC

In the spring, about **1,500** men, women and children came to our Campus Picnic, for a time of fun, fellowship and **gospel-centered community**. We had food trucks, bounce houses, a splash pad, a petting zoo and a dunk tank.



TRUNK OR TREAT

In October, we held a community-wide event called Trunk or Treat and asked you to invite family and friends to join us for fun and fellowship. Kids were able to do some trunk-or-treating, play on bounce houses and enjoy meals from food trucks.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

For this Christmas season, we participated in Operation Christmas Child, a project started by Samaritan's Purse. The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to children in need. You filled and collected many shoeboxes with gifts to be donated to children all around the world.



DALLAS NORTHWAY

Our hearts are full of gratitude as we consider all the things the Lord has done in our midst over this last year. We start with rejoicing over the new sons and daughters of King Jesus who have come to Christ this past year and affirmed their faith publicly through baptism.

In 2017, we had much to celebrate, particularly when it comes to gospel-centered multiplication. We sent out close to 30 Covenant Members, along with Billy and Areia Rose, to establish South Dallas Community Church in the Fair Park neighborhood of our city. We also saw the fruit of Clint Patronella's work in Boston with the launch of the Seven Mile Road church plant. The stories of disciples being made and everything else that the Lord is doing there to see many come to Christ is remarkable.

We've had an increase in attendance for every TVCI class; over 70 men attend our men's Bible class at 6 a.m. on Tuesday mornings. We have seen overwhelming participation in these classes, as well as those attending the Training Program here at the Dallas campus.

Over 100 Home Groups serve our people weekly throughout the city, and several hundred volunteers serve our members and guests each Sunday. We praise God for the numbers of singles and families who have joined our church this past year and the remarkable growth in Little Village due to lots of new children!

We have sent out a number of teams throughout the year on short-term mission trips to share the gospel in our state, in our nation and to the world's nations. From our work in India, Japan, Africa, Germany and Boston, along with our teams sent to serve Houston after Hurricane Harvey, there has been an abundance of the Lord's mercy on our ministry of sending.

The ongoing ministry the Lord has given us at Thomas Jefferson High School and Cary Middle School continues to be one of the most amazing gospel ministries we have on our campus, and we are seeing students' lives being transformed by the life-changing news of Jesus Christ.

We are grateful to have been able to produce our first worship album, *Deliverance & Doubt!* This album is an incredible work by our volunteers and Worship team.

We have no shortage of things to praise God for! May God be glorified as we recount His goodness and faithfulness in 2017 and look ahead to 2018.

SUMMER SERMON SERIES: OUR DALLAS

At the Dallas campus, we had a three-week series about the city of Dallas' past, present and future. Spiritual Formation Pastor Adam Griffin preached passages out of Hebrews, and Campus Pastor Steve Hardin encouraged and exhorted the congregation at the end of each service.

TRANSFORM 2017

Each year, Transform is a great opportunity for us to participate in **gospel-centered service** in our community by helping the teachers and students of Thomas Jefferson High School and Cary Middle School. We share the gospel, set up classrooms, donate backpacks, pray for folks and much more. This year, approximately **1,457** adults and students came out to the event, and **982** students received school supplies and backpacks. Our Prayer Room was in constant use, and families were more open than in previous years to share their prayer requests with us.

SOUTH DALLAS COMMUNITY CHURCH

In 2010, Billy Rose began attending The Village Church Dallas Northway and heard about mentoring youth in South Dallas through Champions of Hope. Already having some urban ministry experience as a teacher, he jumped at the opportunity and became a volunteer mentor. It wasn't long before Billy and his wife, Areia, felt called to move to the neighborhood, and he joined the Champions of Hope staff in 2011, serving there for six years. It was during his time on staff that he had the desire to create a community of disciples in the neighborhood that would serve and love the people there.

DISCOVERY BIBLE STUDY

Over the year, Ricardo Brambila and his family, along with Buckner International, have been ministering among the Bachman Lake community and using the Dallas Northway campus for their Discovery Bible Study. They are passionate about reaching these families—many with economic needs and vulnerable children—by engaging, equipping and empowering them through the gospel. Ricardo has held two Spanish-speaking worship services in 2017 at the campus and is continuing to make gospel-led inroads into the community.



FORT WORTH

Headed into 2018, the Fort Worth elders are excited about what we believe is ahead for the campus.

So far this year, we've endured a difficult season of trial and suffering. Many of you prayed, sent notes, called and asked the Lord to sustain us. He has heard your prayers and is doing a work among our congregation!

Our elders have spent the year before the Lord with much prayer, not wanting to get ahead of Him in our leadership. We've wanted to absorb, heal and walk in faithfulness together.

In considering the identity of and the next steps for Fort Worth, there are a few clear points of vision that we are sowing into, asking the Lord for fruit:

Team Teaching – A team of lay and staff elders will share the pulpit as they proclaim the Word. We believe as Christ gives varied graces, the varied voices themselves are gifts for the preaching of the Word.

Local and Regional – Our members are spread across the greater Fort Worth area—Grand Prairie to Lake Worth, Keller to Mansfield—the Lord has put us in our neighborhoods for His Name. As we minister to our immediate context, we also want to see Jesus lifted up where our people live, and eventually plant churches in these areas.

Kingdom Diversity – Where the Lord has brought diversity of age, background, race and gifting, we are grateful for the gifts Christ has given to His Church. We want Fort Worth to increasingly prepare for heaven by looking more like heaven now: where Christ draws whom He wills to Himself, where our life together in Christ supersedes any marker with which culture would try to divide us.

The Body That Builds Itself Up in Love – We're praying through Ephesians 3:14-4:16, and we ask you to join us! May the Spirit root and ground us in the love of Christ, deepening our capacities to see and abide in Him. May we prize the gift of the Spirit and depend upon Him to help us grow into the fullness of Christ. May the Fort Worth body function rightly and build itself up in love.

CAMP NORTH HILL


The North Hill is an outreach to residents of a Fort Worth apartment complex who are predominantly refugees. During spring break and summertime, we have a three-day "Camp North Hill" for the children of these refugee families from war-torn countries. At camp each evening, the courtyard filled with the sound of children's voices singing praises to God and doing the motions that tell the story of the gospel. The children were placed on teams, led by volunteers of all ages, and played games, did crafts and listened to the gospel story.


This year, we added "Teen Camp" and "Baby Camp." Teen Camp focused on deep, intentional relationships. Baby Camp allowed the mothers who often don't leave their apartments a chance to fellowship together outside while their babies played.

Over 50 adults and more than a dozen youth volunteers engaged more than **140** children and their parents with the love of God through **gospel-centered service** and **gospel-centered community**.

TRUNK OR TREAT

Every October, Trunk or Treat is an opportunity for us to engage with our communities by hosting family-friendly activities on Halloween weekend. We had bounce houses and trunk-or-treating for the kids, as well as fun activities for the whole family. It's one of our largest community outreach events, and this year it was a huge hit once again.





PLANO

When I think about what the Lord is doing at The Village Church Plano, I get excited.

Through the power of the gospel, we desire to see people redeemed, restored and equipped to be and make disciples of Jesus Christ in our city and throughout the world.

We are committed to gospel centrality in all that we do as a church. Every ministry, every teaching, every sermon, every song will be centered on the good news of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We desire to hold fast to the confession of our faith in the sufficiency of Jesus Christ and the authority of the Scriptures.

We also know that the world is really good at teaching us how to live and think like the world. Through our TVCI Bible classes, we are committed to equipping our people to live like Jesus. We have hundreds of men and women in our classes who are passionate to know how to better read, study and apply the Scriptures to their lives.

At the very core of who we are, we are a Great Commission church. As disciples, we believe our absolute calling is to make disciples to the ends of the earth. Most will accomplish this task by staying where they live, work and play here in Collin County. But, our hope is to see more and more respond to the call to take the gospel to the unreached areas around the world.

We want to be quick to open our mouths and proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ to the lost. To those who are far off, might Jesus bring them near by His blood.





SUMMER SERMON SERIES: WE ARE THE CHURCH

Our Plano campus series focused on how the Church is central to God's purposes and what that means for our local church. We studied Ephesians, looking at Paul's message to the church in Ephesus and how we ought to live as believers in Christ.



BACK TO SCHOOL

We sponsored **110** students from neighboring apartment complexes as they went back to school—double our number from last year! More than **200** people served our community as sponsors. Thank you for helping these families and students prepare for the new year and get the supplies they need.

CBA OIL CHANGE EVENT

This year, we partnered with FOCUS at the University of Texas at Dallas to bring college students to our CBA Oil Change event, where lots of people came out to get their oil changed for free by our volunteers. We also had many college students there to wash cars, paint faces and man the bounce houses—all to serve our community and those in need.

WE ARE THE CHURCH

A STUDY IN EPHESIANS

LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE

In the spring, we participated in "Love Where You Live" through the city of Plano. We "adopted" an elderly man's home and went out on three different Saturdays to work on his home. Around **35 volunteers** went out over the three weeks and worked approximately **200 hours**. We painted his house, maintained the lawn, worked on his deck, cleaned and decluttered.

PLANO SANTAS

One of the ways we participate in **gospel-centered service** each year is with "Plano Santas." This Christmas, we are partnering with the Assistance Center of Collin County to provide Christmas gifts for families in need. We'll also have a special service in December where we will worship together and then pass out the gifts to the families.





SOUTHLAKE

At TVC Southlake, we believe we are called to be a gospel outpost in our surrounding cities, which include Southlake, Grapevine, Colleyville, Keller, Hurst, Euless, Bedford and others. We want to be faithful to demonstrate Jesus' words in Matthew 5:14, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden."

We desire to be a gospel outpost that proclaims the clear, distinct sound of the centrality of the gospel in all spheres of life, a sound of grace more beautiful than the sound of all the competing narratives around us. Where members are discipled with a gospel lens through which to see all of life and treasure and pleasure in Christ above all things.

As our members are discipled, every home becomes a gospel outpost in their neighborhood and city, bringing restoration to the broken fabric of their surrounding society (Jer. 29:7). The Great Commission calls us to, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matt. 28:19-20).

And, finally, we send others out to be gospel outposts in other parts of our country and around the world through planting gospel-centered churches and missions. May we follow the call to multiply that the Lord declares in Acts 1:8. "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."




LAUNCH OF RECOVERY GROUPS

One of the ways we live out **gospel-centered community** is through Recovery Groups, a safe place to pursue redemption through Christ from sin and suffering. Recovery Groups meet first in a large group setting for worship through song and a biblically based lesson or testimony, and then divide into smaller groups that target specific issues and struggles.

This fall, we launched Recovery Groups for the first time at the Southlake campus. We had **15** volunteers lead in Recovery Groups and Steps. **44** people came to Recovery Groups, and **108** people went through Steps.

TRANSFORM

One of the ways we participate in **gospel-centered service** in our community is through Transform. In August, we joined up with GRACE Grapevine to provide backpacks and school supplies to children in need in our area. That same month, we also served with the non-profit organization 6 Stones at their “Operation Back 2 School” event in Bedford. Over half of the elementary students in HEB ISD come from economically disadvantaged homes, and this event helped them start the school year off right with supplies and resources.

HURRICANE HARVEY RELIEF EFFORTS



MULTIPLY

The call to gospel-centered multiplication pulls at the heart of our church, and Multiply is the next chapter in that work for The Village. Multiply is a new vision to see the gospel go forth in DFW and beyond. As a church plant ourselves, we feel moved by the Holy Spirit to greater strides in local and global missions. This includes transitioning all our campuses into local, autonomous churches by 2022 and establishing a local church planting network made up of churches within the DFW area. We come to this calling with hope and excitement, eager to witness and be a part of God moving in and through The Village.

THE PLAN

- ▶ **Transition our remaining campuses into autonomous churches**
- ▶ **Plant churches locally with the DFW Church Planting Network**
- ▶ **Plant churches with Acts 29**
- ▶ **Increase local and global missions involvement**

ACTION STEPS

YOU CAN PRAY.

The conviction to transition our campuses was fueled by and a result of many, many prayers, and we must continue to seek the Lord in prayer during the next five years of this process.

HISTORY OF THE VILLAGE

In tracing The Village's history all the way back to the time of Jesus Christ, we see the constant thread of multiplication. Out of the faithfulness of many men and women responding to God's call, The Village came to be part of this history.

A.D. 30

In Jerusalem, Jesus died on the cross, resurrected on the third day and then ascended into heaven.

50 days later, the Holy Spirit fell on the Apostles, giving them power, purpose and a plan.

34

On the road to Damascus, the Lord transformed the heart of Saul, a man who persecuted countless Christians—and Saul became Paul.

After this conversion, the gospel spread further through the ministries of Paul and Peter.

280

Christianity was no longer confined to urban areas. An estimated 10% of the world's population identified themselves as Christian, and the Bible was available in 10 languages.

80

Christianity spread to the countries of France and Tunisia. 20 years later, the first Christians were reported in Monaco, Algeria and Sri Lanka.

Pope Gregory I sent Augustine of Canterbury and a team of missionaries to present-day England. Within the first year, they baptized 10,000 people.

1200

The Bible became available in 22 languages.

1680

The first Franciscan missionaries arrived in Texas.

1462

Gutenberg invented his printing press in Germany. The ability to make many copies of the Bible would affect the spread of the gospel in new and exciting ways.

In Spain, Pope Alexander VI wanted to send Catholic missions to the New World. As a result, Christopher Columbus took priests with him on his second journey to the Americas.

1700

The Great Awakening arose in America, where both George Whitefield and Jonathan Edwards stirred revival throughout the colonies.

1845

The Southern Baptist Convention formed in Augusta, Georgia, and decided to take the gospel out West. Thirteen families established the Holford Prairie Church.

1882

The Holford Prairie Church grew to 37 people and had to move into town, creating First Baptist Church of Lewisville.

1962

The church multiplied, planting Lakeland Baptist Church just down the road.

2002

HVFBC changed its name to The Village Church after Matt Chandler became the lead pastor.

1978

Lakeland Baptist multiplied and planted Highland Village First Baptist Church.

2005

The Village planted Providence Church in Frisco. Multiplication sped along with CityView Church being planted in Keller just a year later.

2007

The Village and Grace Temple Baptist Church united, and the Denton campus was born.

2011

The Village's third church plant, The Door, opened.

2009

The third campus formed, as The Village merged with Northway Baptist Church.

2013

The Village opened its fourth campus, in Fort Worth.

2014

Ever-increasing multiplication sent Blake Chilton to plant Declaration Church in Bryan-College Station.

The Village purchased a church building in the city of Plano and opened its fifth campus.

The elders shared with the church their vision for transitioning campuses into autonomous churches.

2016

The Village Church launched its sixth campus, Southlake, with Carroll Baptist Church.

2015

The Denton campus transitioned into an autonomous church, The Village Church Denton, naming Beau Hughes as pastor.

2017

The Village set forth a vision and timeline to transition its remaining campuses within the next five years, as well as launching a church planting network in the DFW area.

SCOTT BROOKS

*THE DOOR CHURCH,
LEWISVILLE, TEXAS*

Scott first felt the call to plant a church around 2009, when he'd been married for just a year. He was asking God how He wanted to use him to share the gospel and two words came to mind: The Door. The Lord pointed Scott to John 10, where Jesus describes Himself as the door to eternal life.

Over the next few years, this conviction grew through prayer, conversations with others and the strategic relationships Scott formed at The Village with men like Trevor Joy, Jeremy Pace and Josh Patterson. Scott was equipped, trained and commissioned by the elders of The Village to plant a new church in 2011. The men whom Scott was discipling and the families he and his wife were living in gospel-centered community with became the core of The Door Church.

God has blessed The Door over the last six years, growing it to hold three weekend services and move into a permanent location of their own. Their goal is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and love others well. Scott hopes that God will continue growing their church by saving more people, expanding their discipleship communities and guiding them toward faithful multiplication.

Seeing God restore lives, schools and businesses represented by The Door Church has been an enormous blessing. Though there are many challenges to planting a church, Scott believes that God is good and is continuing to sharpen himself and the church body. Their commitment to gospel-centered multiplication has led them to send out multiple missionaries and give thousands of dollars to partner with church planters locally and abroad.

BLAKE CHILTON

*DECLARATION CHURCH,
BRYAN-COLLEGE STATION,
TEXAS*

Blake was on staff in Student Ministry at The Village for nearly 10 years before planting Declaration Church in his hometown of Bryan-College Station, Texas. While at The Village, the Lord grew in Blake the desire to live missionally. He says, “I found the joy of going after the lost son to bring him home, train him up and eventually send him back out to the world for greater purpose.”

After several months of growing conviction for church planting, in June of 2012, Blake had three life-changing conversations in a 24-hour window. Just a few months later, while reading Luke 8, God confirmed the exact call He had for Blake. In January 2014, Blake began meeting with his launch team, and their first official open worship service was March 16, 2014. Jeff Capps and some of the TVC Worship team led worship for that opening service.

Over three years later, the church is growing and making an impact in Bryan-College Station and beyond. Because of their location in a university town, Declaration Church has an attendance of around 300 during the summer months and 1,400 or more during the school year. It’s both an amazing blessing to have so many people desiring to be part of what God is doing and a weighty burden to shepherd them all well. Blake’s biggest challenge has been finding mature, faithful believers to disciple the young church. He is seeing people begin to understand and live out the gospel for the first time, visibly reflected in their marriages, friendships, workplaces and more.

Blake hopes that Declaration Church will continue to reach people with the gospel of Jesus Christ and send out people on mission to their neighbors and the nations. Already, they are engaged in gospel-centered multiplication in many ways. Local Community Groups are filled each week with lost, unchurched and de-churched people hearing the gospel. They have a mentor program taking shape in a local elementary school in one of the community’s poorest neighborhoods. They plan to open a second campus soon, they are helping support two church plants in other states, and they are currently exploring church planting efforts in college towns on the West Coast. They also have a program that develops and deploys church planting missionaries in the Middle East and currently have two families on the field with plans to plant churches in the next 18 months.

CLINT PATRONELLA

*SEVEN MILE
ROAD CHURCH,
WALTHAM,
MASSACHUSETTS*

Close your eyes and pick a spot on the map in Greater Boston. No matter where you point, the need for a church is staggering. When Clint Patronella was in seminary, God called him to the work of church planting but had not yet given him a specific people or place. In October 2012, Clint visited Boston for the first time, and everything changed. That weekend, the Lord placed a burden for the people of Boston on Clint's heart, and he and his family began the journey to plant Seven Mile Road Church in Waltham, a community just nine miles west of downtown Boston.

Clint and his wife, Andea, came to The Village Church in a vulnerable place. Newly married with a child on the way, they were looking for a community where it was okay to not be okay, one that would both support and challenge them. They found such a community at The Village, where Clint eventually came on staff as a Connections minister and then Groups pastor at our Dallas Northway campus. Clint says The Village gave him what seminary couldn't: a people to shepherd and a place to live out the

gospel in everyday life. As the calling and conviction to plant a church grew in Clint, The Village helped to train him up and send him out as a minister of gospel-centered multiplication.

Seven Mile Road Waltham opened its doors in 2017, and their hope is to introduce their neighbors to the goodness, truth and beauty of Jesus Christ. Waltham is a blue-collar town, home to generational families as well as new Bostonians—immigrants, students, young professionals and young families just starting out. Seven Mile Road is a diverse, gospel-formed family of servant missionaries that exists to make disciples in Waltham by providing clear and compelling witness to the real Jesus. They have built gospel-centered multiplication into their DNA, giving away 10 percent of their budget toward church planting efforts locally and abroad. They have a church planter in residence who will train for a few years and then plant in Cape Cod. And they are connected to other Acts 29 churches in Greater Boston for brotherhood, training and multiplication.

Clint says some of the greatest blessings in church planting have come through a place of greatest dependence on God. "I prayed and hoped for God to use us to do His will and see gospel wakefulness come to Waltham. What I didn't expect was that the work He intended to do through us, He also meant to do in us." His marriage and family are stronger than ever as they cling to Christ with dependency and affection. It is challenging to be in a place so different from Texas, away from family and friends, where the winters are long and dark. But God has given Clint faith to trust that the glory to come is better than the challenges they face and that the one who follows Christ will not be disappointed.

RICK WHITE

*CityView Church,
Fort Worth, Texas*

Rick sees his calling to plant a church simply as an extension of his calling to Christ and the work He is doing in the world. During a season of intensified prayer and openness to the Spirit, while reading a book on church planting, he developed an urgent desire to start a new church. While at first hesitant to the idea, upon a positive church-planter assessment from the Acts 29 Network, Rick began to seriously consider planting a new church.

At the time, Rick knew the church he was attending would not be able to send him out as a church planter. In the midst of searching for a sending church, he and his wife, Stephanie, became Covenant Members of The Village. Rick connected with Matt Chandler at the church-planter assessment, and after spending some time together, Matt suggested that The Village could be the Whites' sending church.

CityView Church is located in what Rick calls a "cubicle blue-collar" community, which is reflected in the church body. Many of its people have been in church a long time but have recently been awakened

to the gospel in a new way. The community is diversifying in age and race, and Rick's desire is to reflect that diversity at CityView by reaching more and more people with the gospel. He hopes they will continue to be a beacon of the gospel in north Fort Worth, as well as a base of operations for new church planters. Disciples are making disciples at the church, training future church leaders and multiplying community groups.

Rick says it's a thrill to be part of the work of the gospel, wherever it is happening. Seeing people come to Christ and the impact the gospel is having on neighborhoods around the church is a blessing. One of his biggest challenges as a church planter has been fighting against the consumeristic and commitment-averse culture that many churches have bought into. People hop from church to church, looking for the programs that serve them best instead of settling in and linking arms for the advancement of the gospel.

Over the last 11 years, CityView Church has committed itself to gospel-centered multiplication. They have been privileged to help plant three new churches, one of which, Paradox Church in Fort Worth, has already multiplied by planting another church. They continue to support these churches, as well as the Acts 29 Network. So far, the church has been able to give generously to seven different churches around the world, often for multiple years in a row, and they are committed to giving to at least one new church plant each year.

BILLY ROSE

*South Dallas
Community Church,
Dallas, Texas*

Billy Rose began attending the Dallas Northway campus of The Village in 2010. There, he heard about Champions of Hope, a mentoring program in the South Dallas/Fair Park community. The next year, he joined the Champions of Hope staff, moved to South Dallas and began leading a Home Group there. Eventually, that Home Group multiplied and Billy began to feel the call to plant a church in the community. This conviction grew until South Dallas Community Church was formed.

The church launched in fall 2017 and currently has around 40 committed members, with 65-70 attending each weekend. The historically African-American community has been marked by poverty and crime and was a huge part of the Civil Rights Movement. It remains one of the poorest areas in Dallas, though there is also a wave of gentrification in the northern sector of

the community. The church is ethnically diverse, and Billy hopes for it to be a place that puts on display the reconciling power of the gospel, both between God and man and between different ethnic and socioeconomic groups. “I hope that through disciples made at our church, cycles of injustice would be replaced by cycles of human flourishing that bless our city and glorify Christ.”

It has been amazing to see how God can bring such different people together to be family. From a former drug dealer to a Ph.D. candidate, Christ has made the church one, united by His death and resurrection. One of the biggest challenges Billy faces is pushing through the “churchiness” of the community. There are many people that grew up going to church but don’t know Jesus, don’t believe in Him and don’t trust Him as Savior. It has been hard to cast vision for why a new church can be a good thing.

Though still a very young church, gospel-centered multiplication is a priority for Billy and South Dallas Community Church. Their small groups, called Parish Groups, are multiplying so that they live on mission in particular neighborhoods. They hope to have at least 15 groups in the next five years that will saturate the community with the gospel and allow anyone to walk to a Parish Group.

SAMUEL ORRICO

*ComunidadEs Nova,
Xalapa, Mexico*

Samuel was born and raised in Mexico. As a senior in high school, the Lord saved him and then opened the doors for him to move to the United States to study theology. While at Dallas Theological Seminary, Samuel became a Covenant Member of The Village Church's Dallas Northway campus. During his years in America, the Lord was opening Samuel's eyes to the need for gospel-teaching churches in Xalapa and growing in him the desire to return to Mexico to plant a church. The Village's Sending Program helped prepare Samuel to return to his hometown and do just that.

In January 2017, Samuel planted ComunidadEs Nova. The church currently has 40-50 people attending worship services each weekend and around 25 engaged in missional communities during the week. The city of Xalapa has a population around 500,000, many of whom are students and young adults who identify as creatives and artists. The church hopes to develop leaders to form more missional communities throughout the metro area, eventually planting churches out of those communities. They currently have three brothers in a leadership training program, learning more about preaching and discipleship.

Samuel says one of the greatest blessings of planting ComunidadEs Nova has been seeing firsthand the grace of God at work in the life of his family, his community and himself. "We've had the privilege to see people coming to faith, and it's just amazing. God is for His Church despite ourselves!"

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MULTIPLICATION THROUGH CAMPUS OUTREACH

When [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.”

— MATTHEW 9:36-38



The vision of Campus Outreach is “glorifying God by building laborers on the campus for the lost world,” and they do this through evangelism and discipleship. Our Campus Outreach staff is evangelizing and discipling students at the University of North Texas, the University of Texas at Dallas and the University of Texas at Arlington.

Campus Outreach is compelled by gospel-centered multiplication, and in many ways, it is a visual of what the Church already values. CO multiplies by sharing the gospel with unbelievers on the campuses, who then share the gospel with their friends and family and fellow students. They utilize four phases of “micro ministry” to multiply disciples: **evangelizing, establishing, equipping** and, finally, **exporting** the disciple into the harvest field—the college, the city, overseas on the mission field—for further multiplication.

SUMMER PROJECTS

The Denver Leadership Project (DLP) is CO’s nine-week discipleship intensive training project to help students grow deep in their relationship with God and be equipped to reach others with the gospel of Jesus Christ. This past summer, students all worked full-time jobs in Denver and received training throughout the week on a variety of issues, such as dealing with sin, pursuing holiness, developing Christlike character, leadership development, Bible study, evangelism, etc.

We had 20 students from UT Dallas, 13 from UNT and 6 from UT Arlington in attendance for the DLP. This is the most we’ve had on any summer project since CO DFW began in 2011! The project was impactful in the lives of the students who went, as well as on people in the city of Denver.

The students were also actively involved in Park Church in Denver while there. CO operates under the authority of the local church and strongly believes that church involvement is vital to the spiritual health of the students being ministered to.

We also sent a team of seven (one staff member and six students) to Nagoya, Japan, for seven weeks on the Cross Cultural Project (CCP). The team was connected with Mustard Seed Church and Chad and Hiroko Farmer, missionaries from the The Village Church Denton. The CCP students were actively engaged in evangelism every day on the university campuses in Nagoya. They met over 135 students and were able to develop great relationships with around 40 students. They shared the gospel with 28 students throughout the summer, and at least 10 attended church with the team at some point.

Of the 28 students who heard the gospel, it is likely that none of them had heard it before they met our team. It is incredible to imagine the long-term impact it could have if a small number of these students became Christians and began sharing their faith freely in their family and with their friends. Let’s pray to that end.
